

LONDON, Jan. 7. ---It is announced that after the evictions at Falcarragh are com-pleted, the eviction brigade will turn com-turn pleted, the eviction brigade will turn their attention to the neighboring estates of Harper Nixon's and Mrs. Dalkeg, both of Harper Nixon's and Mrs. Dalkeg, both of which are in Father McFadden's par-ish. 


